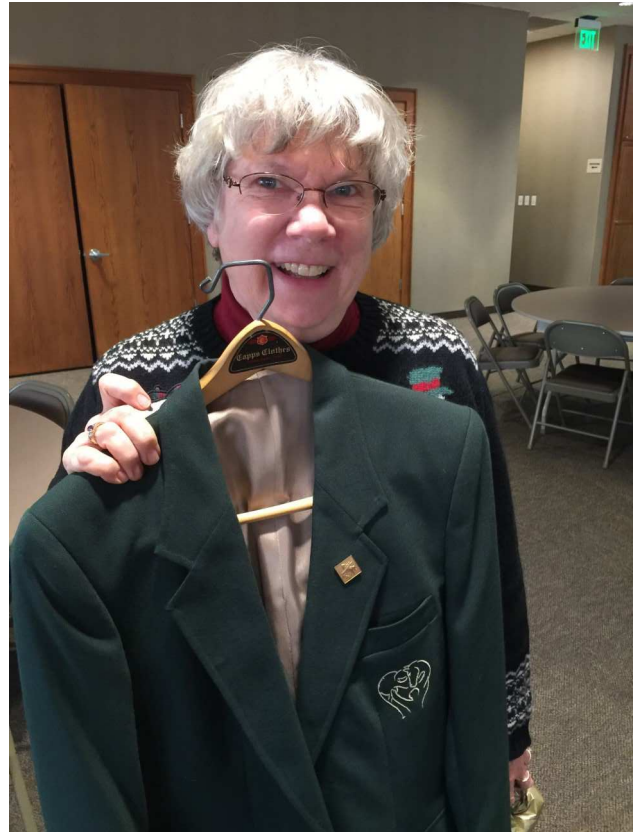
Celebrating 30 years of Miracles!

From humble beginnings, Miracles in Motion celebrates 30 years in 2018! It all started at Upmier Stables near Ely. Verne Upmier was the consummate horseman and thought every kid should have a pony. In the early 80's he started giving pony rides to a child with a disability at his stable. The informal rides led to regular rides. Pretty soon, others around the stable started taking note and thinking interactions with horses could help other children. It was an idea whose time had come.

Sandy Greear, a horsewoman who grew upon a pony at Upmier Stables, took a leap of faith and established Miracles in Motion as a nonprofit organization in 1988. She organized the people, horses and became the first Miracles instructor. She convinced her employer, Quaker Oats, to provide a grant for the startup.

As volunteers and students joined in, more horses were needed. Verne would mention a horse he thought would be a good therapy horse and a volunteer would call the owner and see if they could borrow the horse. They also borrowed Verne's trailer, the tack and other locations around the area including Mosica and the Cedar Rapids Horseman's Club.

Fast forward 30 years and Miracles has a home to call its own on 76 acres east of Swisher! In addition, the herd of 14 horses lives there year-round. Much has not changed, however, it's still a lot about a child and a horse. And there is still a need for lots and lots of volunteers to keep the miracles coming!
