Mix-In-Mingle while engaging in craft activities with our Hippotherapy partners.



Interim Executive Director's Corner

Spring is here, and classes have started! What we have been preparing for is upon us. Hippotherapy (HPOT) sessions, Therapeutic Riding classes and MVECS (Military Veterans Equine Care Squad) sessions are all underway. We are welcoming returning students and volunteers as well as getting to know new ones.

The herd here at Miracles weathered the winter well due to the diligence of staff and volunteers. Since our herd is older (horses must be 10 years or older to join the herd), good nutrition, exercise, hoof and healthcare plus kindness and attention are critical. The farrier and the vet make regular visits and, just like people, the horses have checkups, vaccines, special diets, and exercise.

We are forever grateful for our John Deere tractor (a donation) and the Gravely utility vehicle (still paying on that) to deliver hay to the pastures for the herd of 16 (14 big guys and two miniature horses). The horses appreciate the brand new, large loafing shed (made possible by a beloved donor and contributions from the construction company) that runs the length of the hay barn. This loafing shed provides shelter and protection from the weather and, I believe, is their equivalent to the office water cooler. At least it looks like they are hanging out and catching up. It's also proven to be a good place to take a snooze in the afternoon.

Maintaining the fences is a constant, almost daily task. From the mischievous Raven trying to open a gateway to Diamond, Jasper, Little Guy and Mr. Sea's lot and pasture to big, old Blaze, a Belgian/Morgan draft horse looking for boards and posts to itch his skin beneath his thick winter coat, the staff are kept busy trying to keep up with repairs.

I had the privilege of being a Horse Leader in the Monday Therapeutic Riding classes. It was good to be "in the saddle" again-well, at least leading the horse. Since I have been at Miracles, I have been collecting sayings related to horses and riding. I never tire of discovering new ones to add to my list or spouting the old ones to whomever crosses my path. There are an amazing number of them. In fact, I think sometimes that they are a significant part of the English language-maybe even a couple of blocks in the foundation. Oh, yeah, Blaze knocked some of those off the arena periphery, too. Just scratching.

We are looking forward to this season for so many reasons - classes, special events, horse training, volunteering to help others, it's all so rewarding. There literally is something for everyone. As I've said many times before, I love this organization. And, mostly, I love to see what riding and relationships with horses does for our students, staff and volunteers.

Newspaper coverage from MVECS presentation

On March 26, Ken Manley, Miracles In Motion Barn Manager and Veteran Coordinator, and Mary Chadwick, Miracles In Motion Board Parent Advisor, presented a program to the Conrad American Legion Auxiliary Unit #681 and their guests. Mary spoke on the history of Miracles and the programs we have to offer for children and adults with physical and cognitive disabilities. Ken, a veteran himself, presented on the MVECS Heroes in Motion program and shared with the audience the vision behind the MVECS program. "The horse is a mirror to what is going on around them. A soldier who returns is just like that horse - not always trusting people, but instead, responding to emotions. That's why this program is such a great fit for returning veterans."

Our Miracles in Motion MVECS first session has begun. This 10-week program focuses on communication, anxiety reduction, impulse modulation, assertiveness, and creative freedom. Veterans work with our program leaders to learn about, interact, bond with, and care for horses in the Miracles herd. It is designed for U.S. Military Veterans and is grant funded. Each class is limited to six students.



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
