Of all our therapy horses, Blaze is probably most affected by hot, humid weather. We don't use him in class if the temperature is over 75 degrees. The week of 90-degree-plus temperatures was a particular challenge for us. We ran the arena sprinkler system and gave all of the horses access to the arena, which they definitely took advantage of! A heavy-duty fan was pulling warm air out the west door to create a bit of a breeze. Blaze received extra attention with a cooling wet-down each day.

In preparation for clipping his very thick coat, we recently did even more with a shampoo, rinse, dry and then haircut. He was in a stall with a fan blowing and seemed to very much appreciate the attention!

Thanks to a great fencing crew!

Our appreciation goes out to neighbor, Joel Van Zante; board members, Joe Petta and Jerry Mohwinkle; farm maintenance person, Nick Andeway; as well as volunteers Bruce Guyer and Stan Barta for putting up a fence that will make the south pasture much more functional and safe for the horses! This spring, we were again challenged by a boggy area in the south pasture – with more than one vehicle becoming stuck in soft ground! It also ended up being an escape route for a couple of our adventuresome horses! By running a fence east and west and dividing the south pasture, we are able to have another area for facilitating pasture management and introducing new horses to the herd. Joel brought his skid steer with an auger to quickly dig holes for the posts; Nick and Joe had the job well organized with fence posts and rails already laid out and Jerry, Bruce and Stan brought a “can do” attitude that made what could have been an all-day project into a morning of hard work.



Phase two of our newly divided pasture – goats and sheep to clear off the vegetation!

Once our new pasture area was secure, we needed to get rid of some unsavory (at least to horses) vegetation that was hiding some large rocks making it difficult to mow without potential damage to equipment. Twin Pine Farm in Manchester brought a trailer of voracious goats and sheep to help with the vegetation removal. It was quite the sight to see the horses watch their temporary pasture mates being unloaded! I'd have to say “curious, but wary”. Once the goats and sheep decided it was okay to exit the safety of their trailer, about 35 animals quickly jumped out and disappeared in the several-foot-high vegetation. This environmentally safe way to get rid of undesirable and noxious weeds is a great solution for Miracles as goats prefer poison ivy, garlic mustard, curly dock, honeysuckle and Canadian thistle to grass for food. Once the goats have done their job, the horses and periodic mowing will keep the pasture healthy.
