Our thanks to past volunteer, Dianne Lacina, for sharing her Miracles Moment:

“I am an old volunteer (in every sense of the word) . There were many Miracles Moments in the years I was a Side Walker, but the one that stands out the most occurred twenty-some years ago – the second year I was paired with a young girl with autism. She was 7 at the time and had never spoken. When she would pet her horse, it was from a couple inches away. She could feel the energy from there. I was excited to be working with her again, she was so sweet. The first day of that second-year session she settled into the saddle and “petted” her horse. Then the students were instructed to tell their horses to “walk on.” We all heard this sweet loud voice go ‘Wah ahh!’ All of us were stunned and as she rode her horse around the arena her parents were on the rail with tears in their eyes, as we all had. Her first words – ‘Walk On’.”

With all she does for Miracles, Deb has gone a step further and “adopted” Jasper, our oldest therapy horse. When asked “Why Jasper?”, she replied, “What can I say – I wish he could talk. Jasper is a gentle soul and you see that in his mannerisms and just by looking into his eyes. I met Jasper 12 years ago at the Miracles 20th Anniversary celebration. I fell in love with him then and am more in love with him now that I see him every day.”
